Pastor's Message Silence

Dear Parishioners,

The summer is over, and daily life has started once again. This can be heard very well from the parsonage at Beaverhill Dr, where the humming of the traffic streaming from the East into the city, is getting louder in the morning again. Also, the announcements of the active, neighboring highschool are hard to miss. Only the birds in the garden have not changed their volume in the mornings, and it is joyful to be woken up by them in the early hours.

After canoeing for three weeks in the unfrequented waters of Wabakimi Provincial Park, all this noise, of course, is particularly striking. Memories of a lake in the morning light, calm and smooth as a mirror, where you hardly dare to disturb the silence with the strokes of your paddle, seem to be almost unreal. Rather than disturb it, the occasional cry of a faraway loon is really what makes you conscious of the uniqueness of this silence.



How seldom this still occurs! We are constantly surrounded by the noises of our civilization, by cars, lawnmowers, radios, sirens of police cars or ambulances. But, as I have been told, for some people the constant level of noise to which we are exposed, is not a threat but rather a consolation. They'd rather not have silence. To them silence feels rather unsettling. Quite a few people associate silence with solitude- which is true in most cases and to a lot of people, solitude seems unbearable.

That is why, at home, the radio or the TV is always on, because this way, the disturbing feeling of being alone is drowned out with noise.

I perceive silence as something beautiful. Silence helps me focus, and, as silence seldomly lasts long, I don't experience it as worrisome.

I also remember that it was said about Jesus that he would often retreat into the desert, into solitude and silence. To him this was always a place of prayer. A time to talk to God undisturbed. A time to gain new strength, and a time to focus on the essence of his task among the many questions. By the way, Jesus did not invent this idea of listening to the silence, which for him was also always a place to talk (to pray) to God. We hear about the Prophet Elia, who once emphatically voiced the desire to encounter God. It is astounding, what Elia reports. God was neither in the storm which came first, nor in the earthquake which followed, but only at last, in a gentle wisp of wind did the Prophet Elia recognize him. Apparently, silence is a special opportunity to encounter God.

The silence of a lake in the morning, about which I wrote in the beginning, let me marvel most of all about the greatness and beauty of God's wonderful creation. Again and again, in history there have been people seeking silence because they wanted to experience God's presence.

We said goodbye to the Preston Street Church building through a special service held on June 3rd. It was very moving and all attending found the affair bitter sweet. It was a great building that evokes many memories. On the other hand the ongoing construction, the dirt, the obscurity and the difficulty to find parking spaces made it clear that there is no future for that building as a church.

As you all know our worship services are musically enriched by the talents of our organist MaryAnn Foley and her brother Peter. We all love his voice and the way it beautifies our service. We have therefore by a council resolution appointed him Tenor of the Martin Luther Church.

Then in June we had a council retreat at Konrad's cottage which proved very successful. We agreed:

- on a mission statement for the church, which is undergoing some last minute polishing from Pastor Demke
- to hold one joint service on the first Sunday of each month at 9:30, using alternatively the English and German order of services.
- A on rough priorities regarding the use of the proceeds from the Preston Street church roof repair, kitchen renovation, spruce up of basement, fixing the heating system, repairing the organ, planning a new kindergarten
- we adopted a policy on Harassment in the workplace. Parenthetically we are the first congregation in the Synod to do so. Not to blow our own horn too much, it was the insurance company that requires such a policy and the enforcement thereof. - we decided to hire sexton/janitor, part-time to look after our church building. Jonathan Ladouceur will be entrusted with this task.

The sale of the Preston Street is proceeding on schedule. The purchasers waived all conditions. congregation on August 5, at a Special Congregational Meeting approved the sale for 1 Million dollars by a vote of 51 to 2 proxies). The Purchasers (including deposited another \$ 25 000 with our solicitor on August 7 and a final deposit of a further \$ 25 000 will follow in October. Closing of the transaction will take place on January 9, 2019.

The gathering theme was "Threads", an analogy for our lives as one small part of the bigger tapestry that is the body of Christ. We heard some incredible stories of sadness, loss, rejection, joy, healing, and renewal from the brave keynote speakers, who dared to speak their truth in front of over 500 youth. The youth were then given the opportunity to practice sharing and listening in different ways. We

all participated in the second largest 'blanket exercise' (www.kairosblanketexercise.org) in history, as well as a project that involves the offering of a huge donation of socks and encouraging notes to an organization that works with homeless and hurting people in Thunder Bay.

We would like to extend a huge thank you for everyone's support, both financial and prayerful. The experiences of our youth in worship and word was incredibly enriching, and their growth in faith was far beyond any expectations. We hope to attend the next CLAY again in Calgary in 2020!

Eastern Synod Assembly 2018

The 2018 biennial gathering of the ELCIC Eastern Synod took place in Toronto from June 21-24. Almost 300 representatives of the various ministries from across the synod gathered to worship, sing, vote on the issues and learn about each other and the ministries they aspire to.

As with all such assemblies, one highlight is worship. We used the Inshallah songbook as our hymn book, and experienced worships that were inspirational, worshipful, stirring and challenging – sometimes all at the same time.

We also used some of the time of the assembly to address the theme of "Neighbourliness" – who is our neighbour, what do they look like, and how do we as God's people best serve our neighbours – how do we be good neighbours to others. We discussed, prayed about, and cried over issues of racial justice, reconciliation, gender, and religious diversity, grappling with the questions of what form our ministries and church should take to best address these challenges.

There is always a business aspect to these gatherings. This assembly saw the re-election of Bishop Mike Pryse, Synod vice-chair Laurie Knott, secretary Wendell Grahlman and Treasurer Keith Myra (who is something of a budgetary genius) to six-year terms. We

selected delegates from the Synod for the upcoming National Convention in 2019. We discussed the renaming and renewal of ministry for Waterloo Lutheran Seminary, now known as "Martin Luther University College". We grappled, as always, with financial matters such as the Synod's budgets for the next 3 years, and the disbursement of proceeds from the sale of assets of ministries that are concluding, such as that of Camp Edgewood.

The assembly wound up with a celebratory banquet that included the recognition of ministry landmarks, including the 50th anniversary of the ordination of our member Ted Heinz.

Conference for pastors of Germanlanguage congregations outside of Germany

Two years already past by again, I thought, when, in July, I took up quarters in the Protestant Academy in Bad Boll. There was the venue of the conference for all pastors who'd been sent abroad by the Evangelical Church in Germany (EKD). This time I participated in a special training for "homecomers". Even though that is still two years in the future, this was nevertheless the last conference for me, because by the time of the next one, I will already be back in Germany. To tell the truth, it was a strange feeling because I am incapable of imagining that my time in Ottawa will be truly over by then. But, despite not being able to imagine it as of yet, I learned how to apply correctly for a vacant pastorate, and what kind of support for resettlement there is in Germany. The binder with all of these papers was safely stowed on a shelf as soon as I got back, because for the time being, I will not be needing it.

During this meeting, Claudia
Ostarek from the Evangelical Church in
Germany (EKD) who is in charge of
supervising and facilitating the process of
calling a new pastor, has announced that
she will visit our congregation in October
in order to get acquainted with the
changes in our church, so that she will be
able to propose the most qualified person
for our congregation at the preselection.

Of course, I re-encountered some old acquaintances, for example Christoph

Ernst, my predecessor here, who sends his warmest regards to everybody. Besides working through themes, such as when we dealt with the relation of church and state in lectures and had some heated discussions, I was most of all impressed by the changes at the conference centre. There were absolutely no plastic or styrofoam cups for all the coffee which people were drinking; the toilets were flushed with rainwater, which was collected in an external cistern; the hallways were lit with the power of the solar collectors that covered all the roofs; the kitchen only used locally bought products; the parking spots in close vicinity to the Academy were reserved either for people with disabilities or for electric cars (for which, of course, there were power outlets available to charge the battery). The heating for the whole big complex was done with wood pellets. Of course, we did not need the latter, since we had temperatures well over 30 degrees Celsius. Because of the heat, wide automatic shutters covered the windows on the sunny side, whereas during the night, when the temperature sank to under 20 degrees, the windows in the conference rooms automatically opened to let fresh and cool air stream into the rooms.

I, at least, marvelled at all the things you can do to treat the precious resources of our environment more attentively and carefully than we usually do.

Brass Orchestra from Germany

From the 3rd to the 10th of October, the Brass Orchestra of Berlin-Brandenburg, Germany, is coming for a visit. Five years ago, they were here during a concert tour under the artistic direction of Barbara Barsch. Back then, they had announced that they would come back – and here they are.

In our congregation they will perform twice. First, they will play on Sunday, October 7th at 9.30 am in the english-speaking Thanksgiving worship service in our church at 933 Smyth Road. The second time they will in the afternoon, in the german-speaking Thanksgiving worship service, which will take place at 2 pm in the garden of the German ambassador's residence (290 Coltrin Road).

In and around Ottawa, the Brass Orchestra will give the following concerts:

 Friday, October 5th at 6 pm in Montreal, St John's Lutheran Church (3594 Jeanne Mance)

- Saturday, October 6th at 3 pm in Ottawa, Faith Lutheran Church (43 Meadowlands) at a prayer meeting before Thanksgiving ("brass and bratwurst" - but NOT an Octoberfest!)
- Tuesday, October 9th at 7 pm in Brockville, St. Lawrence Anglican Church (80 Pine St, Brockville)

From the10th to the 15th of October, the Brass Orchestra will be in Toronto, where they will perform in the Martin Luther Church (2379 Lake Shore Blvd West).

The members of the brass orchestra come from different congregations in Berlin and the surrounding regions. They meet every week for rehearsals, play in worship services in the big city churches like Berlin Cathedral, Church of St Mary or Kaiser Wilhelm Memorial Church, and at events of the regional church. They also tour the countryside with musical worship services and go to places where there normally isn't a lot of church music. They form special choirs for the big worship services on Advent and Christmas, and perform at nationwide events.
